## **Outdoor Encounters**

I saw a yellowed leaf fall yesterday, just the barest ripple of the coming inevitable avalanche of change. Those of us who live with the seasons know the truth of the remark once made by the writer M.C. Richards: "Whatever has form is in the process still of being formed. Form is never fixed."

We "seasoned" souls know all too well. And so it is with any year, especially for those that spend their 365 1/4 days within an Earth zone of distinctly marked seasons. Shrub and tree buds appear in winter and early spring, followed by both new twigs and baby leaves that grow gradually into full-fledged photosynthesis factories. Then they shed, only to be, in time, replaced.

The big bluestem grass on our prairies reveals the annual turning to its characteristic, and beautiful, russet brown. This annual growth of the forty or so native Flint Hill grasses is what ecologists and range management experts refer to as "primary production." Unless a pasture is severely over-gazed, a surprisingly small percentage of primary production is utilized by large herbivores. Of course, grasshoppers and other beasties get in their licks, but much primary production will weather the winter only to be burned off in spring to make more room for eager grass shoots emerging from roots eternal.

Fall brings a diminishing variety of birds to our feeders and we hear tales of migration—although mostly only of birds from Kansas, at least during this century. We not only lose species to the



South, but also never know which of the many coming from farther north will show up on our pond. Frequent checks can prove rewarding. And if any serious birders have not tuned into the migration season bird-watching possibilities on the waters below the tubes of Tuttle Creek Dam, please do so.

Those of us who have not for some time lived close to the soil may forget that Nature's preparation for and survival of winter is complicated and fascinating process. Surprising tales can be told about how places, mammals, reptiles, fishes, amphibians—and some birds and insects—get through a Kansas winter. We hope to tell some of these tales throughout the cold months ahead, stories that can be read while sitting in the comfort offered by central heating.

Join Michelle Lehmer at 2 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 14, in the West Conference Room to create greeting cards for Halloween!




### Spot a sign, win a prize ticket!

#### **Beware of Scam!**

A couple weeks ago, I shared about the National Do No Call Registry. Since then, a few residents and neighbors have reported being contacted by scammers via telephone.



Remember, scammers will say anything and their goal is to get you to say "yes."

Every year people lose money to phone scams – make sure you aren't one of them! If you receive a phone call from someone you don't know who is trying to sell you something you didn't plan on buying, either say no thanks or simply hang up the phone. Some scammers seem friendly; they will try to win your trust by asking for your first name, inquiring about your family or making small talk. They may even claim they are with a company you trust and pressure you to give up personal information like a credit card number or social security number. Do not hand out personal information to people you don't know or trust.

Everyone is potential target, but some scammers concentrate on specific groups like older adults. Some offers they may call about include free trials, foreign lotteries, extended car warranties, credit and loans, and travel packages.

Additionally, automated phone calls can be a scam threat. These are called robocalls and you should hang up immediately when you receive a robocall trying to sell you something. Do not interact, including pressing buttons to be taken off the call list or to talk to a live person.

Don't become a victim of a scam! If it seems illegitimate, it probably is. Contact myself or Monte Spiller, Resident Services Leader, if you have questions or concerns regarding phone scams or the National Do Not Call Registry. See you next week and thanks for stopping by!

## **RESIDENT COUNCIL MINUTES**

Meeting Date: September 14, 2015

Sandra Emley welcomed all meeting attendees.

#### **Updates**

1. Lonnie shared there is a lot of construction going on. The Prairie Star Restaurant renovation will start on September 21, with it lasting approximately 45 days. Phase 2 of the Honstead/Sloan renovation will start around the same time. Also slated for this fiscal year is a new outdoor therapy area by the Bramlage House, expected to start in the spring of 2016. The new area is intended to make therapy more fun and allows individuals to be more goal oriented. The area will include a green house, walking trail, horse shoe court and putting green.

Lonnie reported, LeadingAge Kansas President and CEO, Larry Minnix is retiring and was in attendance at this past conference. He encouraged members of LeadingAge, not to forget why we are not for profit. The topic of housing with services was also discussed. The belief is Kanas will begin to see more affordable housing communities with services being built, but within budgeted way and less regulations. The minimum wage conversation is also being watched closely which brings concern. Changes in minimum wage would affect the rates at Meadowlark Hills as the task of retaining employees would be challenged. We would be competing with fast food restaurants, who could offer more pay with a mandated increase in minimum wage. Another discussion was a possible cap for salaried employees. The cap would be set at roughly \$50,000 annually. The other option is to change them to hourly.

The Meadowlark Auction was a success, with over \$6500.00 dollars being raised. Becky Fitzgerald did a great job along with several volunteers. For next year's auction, Becky has found a donor of two 12x30 storage units to store items.

2. Building and Grounds Update: Loren Alexander talked about the signage on campus and expressed it will remain the same for now. The rumble strips will go in where there are bumps and signs will be added accordingly. Concerning Fire Alarms, staff is looking at getting a chime system rather than the buzz. Having alarms in each of the tower apartments is being considered.

Maintenance requests that residents complete a work order at the Hospitality Desk for inside and outside work and concerns that need attention.

Ed Skidmore reported the rumble strips should be completed by November 1, along with crosswalk signs. Ed also followed up and explained that the recent loss of communication services and telephones were due to current construction and concrete being put in.

3. Board Update: No reports at this time.

#### **Approval of July Minutes:**

Motion to approve minutes was moved, seconded and passed with correction.

#### **New Business:**

- 1. A request was made for more timely updates on Touchtown when a change occurs for scheduled events. Residents are encouraged to stop employees and ask for information and in most cases they will know the answer or direct you to someone who does.
- 2. Concern about the consistency of the sound system and microphone in the community room was brought up. Monte Spiller explained that IT is currently looking at options to fix the issue and are aware of the problem.
- 3. Concern about the messenger and the accuracy of the articles, signs, and the opportunities page. Sarah Duggan explained that new staff was currently learning the process and felt confident it will improve.
- 4. Reminder that the Meadowlark Hills policies are now available at the front desk. We will be reviewing those at the Resident Council meeting.

## **KSU Football Watch Party**


